Course Description

ART 116, Intro to Digital Media, is a digital studio course that concentrates on the basics of digital media, including imagery, sound, video, animation, (by use of Adobe Creative Suite) and the internet as a research tool. The internet plays an important role for the class; students will participate in a class blog and develop a research practice using the Internet. This course will provide the groundwork for creating and interpreting digital media as an art form.

Assignments are given to engage students in both the technical and conceptual aspects of digital media. Students will employ a diverse range of techniques, as they become familiar with contemporary artistic processes involving the use of a computer. The majority of the class will consist of hands-on experimentation supplemented by slide lectures, videos, and further academic exploration.

Intro to Digital Media is a requirement for Intermedia majors. This course may be substituted for the required ART 113, Color, for photography and Digital Art Majors. If you have already taken ART 113, Color, this course may be counted as an art elective. However, keep in mind it is a 100-level elective. Please see your academic advisor for more specific information.

Course Objectives

- To look at digital media, art, technology and society through developing an understanding of vision, reality, representation, appropriation and communication.
- To develop digital literacy, including file maintenance
- To learn technical skills using the following softwares: Adobe Photoshop, Adobe Illustrator, Adobe Premier Pro, Adobe Audition
- To create and be a a part of an online arts community by posting and sharing projects and internet research on the class blog.
- To learn how to use the internet as a sketchbook for ideas (research)
- To critically consider the affect of art and technology on society

Art Disclaimer

Contemporary art is incredibly varied and at times can even be shocking. Be open to expanding what you think of as "art." Art is often not rated PG13, nor does it uphold any specific rule of moral standards. You may see examples of art that contain nudity, profanity, violence, or points of view other than your own.

Course Requirements

Throughout the entire semester, each student will be expected to fully participate in all aspects of this studio course. **Assignments, class discussion, blogging and critiques.**

In addition to the completion of assigned projects on time, students are expected to attend class regularly, conduct themselves with a sense of good studio etiquette, and participate in class discussions and critiques. There will be multiple assignments and/or one large project assigned for each unit. Projects will be graded on understanding and successful use of concepts, creativity, and craftsmanship.

Students will also be active members of the class blog where projects and internet research assignments will be posted and written about. Reading assignments will be accompanied by discussion in class; students should prepare notes on the reading assignment to be prepared for discussions.

In digital computer work everything takes longer than you expect it to! Plan accordingly as to not be late on assignments! Never assume a small edit will take only five minutes. I guarantee you 9 times out of 10 it will take you longer!

Late Work: If you feel your work is going to be late for any reason please contact me A.S.A.P. Whether or not I will accept late work will be case by case basis.

Coursework Description and Criteria

There are five units in this class: web/vector, raster, sound, animation, video Unit Exercises: These assignments are designed to help establish technical skills and to explore aesthetics and design elements. They are typically short assignments that are not always critiqued as a group. They may or may not require a blog post and a written statement.

Unit Projects: These are the final assignments given in each unit that encompass both the technical skill of the exercise and a developing concept. Unit projects will be presented to the class for critique. Unit projects will be posted on the class blog and accompanied by a two paragraph artist statement. (There will be a hand out about artist statements)

Unit Quizzes: There will be a few quizzes a semester to assess the student's understanding of the course.

Internet Research and Blog: This component of the class is a semester long research project. Students will be asked to search for and post selections from the internet to the class blog along with a written statement based on a prompt given by the instructor. This will be a weekly homework assignment that will be a class discussion every Monday.

Evaluation

Grading will be based on a combination of factors including: Execution, Quality of the work, Concept (your idea behind the work), Presentation, Participation, and Attendance. When assignments are handed out, you will be informed of the scoring rubrics to be used for that particular project.

- *Any extra credit opportunities will be announced in class.
- *Grades may be reduced in the event of poor attendance.

Critiques

Critiques are mandatory. If you do not show up for these dates, you will **FAIL** that assignment. Even if a student's work is incomplete, the student's presence is required. You will be better off bringing an unfinished project to the critique than not showing up or not presenting anything at all.

Attendance

Attendance is mandatory and extremely important. Absent students will miss technical demonstrations and lectures that will prove vital to their artistic development. You are allowed 2 UNEXCUSED ABSENCES.

Therefore:

3 unexcused absences = one letter grade drop from final grade

3 partial attendance (late arrivals [15 minutes or more after class starts] and/or early class departures [30 minutes or more from when class ends]) = 1 absence

Example: All other projects put together, you earn a total of 85%, which is B. However, you were absent twice (without any documentation to excuse it) and arrived 20 minutes after class started 3 different times. This equals 3 absences, which makes your final grade a C.

It is expected that students will stay for the entirety of class. If a student is missing for a significant amount of class time, the student may be marked absent (at the instructor's discretion). If for some reason you cannot attend a class, contact me via e-mail prior to class to make arrangements for making up what you have missed. Contacting me in advance does not excuse the absence in terms of grading.

7 or more unexcused absences will result in failing the class

For an absence to be excused, it MUST be accompanied by a note from doctors, student services, or other evidence that demonstrates the need to miss class.

Losing a file right before critique is not an excuse for not having your assignment and will result in a zero for that project.

Please let me know if you are struggling for any reason. Please use your common sense if the issue, question or concern dictates an email, a text, or a phone call. I am not a person who will interrupt who I am talking to or what I am doing to answer a phone call, so if you call don't expect an immediate answer, you may leave a voicemail. Text me short questions, email me longer ones. I will respond within 24 hours, sometimes sooner but it is not a guarantee. I am also around the campus, so if you see me and have questions go ahead and ask.
